There will be a lot of smiling kids of deployed service members thanks to volunteers from Naval Station Great Lakes (NSGL), and the surrounding communities who assembled Hero Packs last Saturday at the St. James Elementary School, Highwood, Ill.

Two hundred assembled packs will be presented to children during a special ceremony in April, the Month of the Military Child, noted Kelcey Liverpool, co-founder, and CEO of Kids Rank. "This is just great and I appreciate the community support for the kids and it enhances what we are doing," she said.

The purpose of the drive, started by Operation: Military Kids, is to provide backpacks to children of deployed parents to give them the feeling of connection with their mothers and fathers who are serving in the military. The packs are filled with blank photo albums, notepads, small art kits, craft activities, stationery stamps, books, games, and mini scrapbook kits.

When geographically dispersed military parents living in civilian communities are mobilized, their children have unique needs for special support and services. They are military kids but they still look the same to teachers, friends, and the rest of the community. Their lives are turned upside down. Many of their usual support systems may no longer be adequate. Extensive media coverage of on-going military operations can create daily anxiety. These military kids need to connect with other youth in similar situations. They seek friends and adults who can empathize and can help them cope with their new world.

Operation: Military Kids creates state and local community support networks for military youth when military parents are deployed. It delivers a wide range of recreational, social and educational programs for military youth living in civilian communities. The program acknowledges the strengths and sacrifices of military kids as everyday home front heroes through Hero Packs and special recognition events. It also educates the public on the im-

port of the deployment cycle for service members, families, kids and the community as a whole.

"In times like these Guard/Reserve children of deployed parents seem isolated," said Linda Kupferschmid, program director, Operation: Military Kids.

"This is a great way for us to say thank you as an individual and a community. This program benefits the service members and their families when we show support at home."

"I am very proud of our Ombudsmen for stepping out of their already significant roles in supporting our military families to contribute their personal time for this worthy cause," said Capt. John Malfitano, commanding officer, NSGL, who volunteered his time in setting up and filling backpacks. Also lending a hand was QM1 William Partlow, NSGL quarterdeck leading petty officer.
